




## **HSF: Celebrating 40 Years of Development Cooperation in the Philippines**

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This publication is a confluence of stock knowledge, written reports, meetings and discussions, experiences as well as concepts and ideas gathered and shared during the implementation of the projects from 1979 to 2019, including contributions from project partners and other relevant stakeholders. It was made possible through the Hanns Seidel Foundation of Germany (HSF) which is financed by the Federal Ministry for Economic Cooperation and Development (BMZ) of the Federal Republic of Germany.

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## Introduction

When the Hanns Seidel Foundation (HSF) established its project office in the Philippines in 1979, the world was quite different from today: Internet and Social Media were not even imaginable, phone calls to Europe had to be pre-registered and were highly expensive, EDSA was considered as a highway and nobody had an idea what the term “millennials” could mean.



No doubt, the environment and circumstances in the Philippines have changed since then and so has the work of the Hanns Seidel Foundation in the country. The focus of our work concentrated in the beginning on vocational training and support to civil society; today it is on the “Rule of law” and support for democratic institutions. But what did not change is our continued support and the friendship between Germany and the Philippines.



It has often been said that “a journey of a thousand miles begins with the first step” and this aptly describes our longstanding cooperation with the Philippines as it aims to propel the country in “laying a strong foundation for inclusive growth, a high-trust and resilient society, and a globally competitive knowledge economy.”

For the Hanns Seidel Foundation, our first steps in the Philippines began in 1979 with a partnership with the Center for Research and Communication, that had – at the time – their office still in Bocobo Street in Malate, Manila. In 1981, the first permanent Resident-Representative of the Hanns Seidel Foundation, Mr. Dieter Appelt, arrived in the country and until 1996 to the Ortigas Complex in Pasig, where we were graciously hosted by our partner, the Center for Research and Communication, and from 1996 onwards to the office on Rufino Street in Makati City, where you can still find us today.



As we celebrate this milestone in the Foundation’s international cooperation program in this part of the world, it is a fitting occasion to give recognition to the programs and projects that redound to the benefit of the people, as well as to the partners and stakeholders that gave life and meaning towards their fruition. Hence, this publication – “HSF: Celebrating 40 years of development cooperation in the Philippines.”

The development work of HSF in the Philippines can be gleaned in key periods of the country’s history from 1979 to the present and contributing in three (3) major programs -- **poverty reduction, good governance, and international cooperation and exchange.**

With the objective of helping reduce poverty incidence especially in the countryside, HSF supported several joint undertakings in the area of technical skills development and strengthening of the co-operative system.





In response to the growing problem of lack of skilled manpower needed by the industry sector, HSF together with its partners worked on the adoption of the German “Dual Training System” (DTS) for technical and vocational courses in the country. It is noteworthy to share that as of today, the DTS has been adopted in key industries, namely, in Electrical, Electronics and Mechanical Technology; Food and Beverage Services; Information Technology and Business Process Outsourcing; and Microfinance Operations.

In an effort to promote countryside development, it has endeavored to harness the co-operative movement in the country by promoting co-operative consolidation and integration along the economic value chain, which was pursued in priority areas nationwide. Towards this end, it has established coop-led mechanisms such as a co-

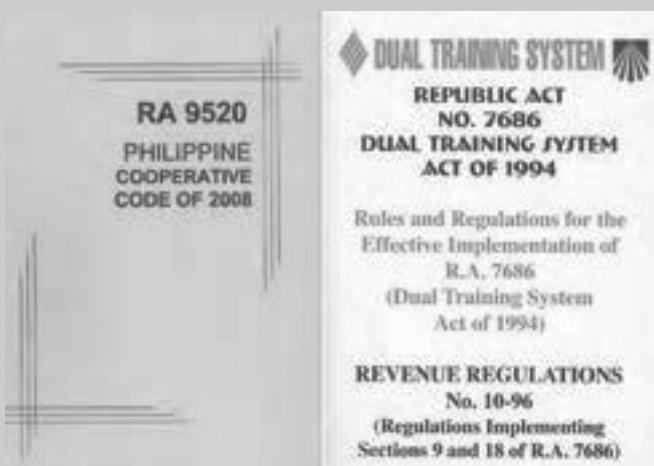
op deposit insurance system and a mutual fund, among others.

In view of the important contributions of these projects in nation-building, HSF in cooperation with its partners and critical stakeholders helped paved the way for these pioneering initiatives to be institutionalized with the enactment into law of the **Dual Training System Act of 1994** (R.A. No. 7686) and the **Philippine Cooperative Code of 2008** (Republic Act No. 9520).



As part of its commitment to sustain the gains in helping improve the quality of life of majority of Filipinos, further support has been extended towards enhancing good governance, specifically in terms of strengthening the rule of law, access to justice, and respect for human rights.

In line with the government’s thrust towards community-oriented public safety law enforcement anchored on professionalism and competence, HSF together with its partners, supports a number of projects that promote dialogue and information exchange to arrive at common solutions to national and regional concerns. Among these are police training and education, and community-based dialogues on human rights promotion and protection resulting in the integration and mainstreaming of human rights principles and standards in law enforcement and rules of engagement and, equally important, gaining the trust and respect of the people in the communities.





The clarion call to advance peace and development particularly in Mindanao opened greater opportunities for engagement with both Christian and Muslim communities in pursuit of their collective desire to address their civil rights and legal concerns. At the same time, to further enhance coordination and collaboration between two important pillars of the criminal justice system, joint efforts are ongoing between public prosecutors and police investigators which shall contribute to the reinforcement of the rule of law and on the overall peace and order condition in the country.

Working along the collective vision of Filipinos in the next years, HSF and its partners actively participates in increasing public awareness towards the proposed shift to a federal system of government. The activities being undertaken aim to provide broader and deeper knowledge of the philosophy and principles of federalism as a form of government and help key representatives



of government and members of society gain a better and more comprehensive understanding of federalism.

In line with its work at the regional level, HSF supported forums for discussion of various issues related to economic and political cooperation and integration, environmental management as well as trade relations and investment policies within ASEAN together with its partners.

Corollary to the foregoing programs and projects is the Exchange Program, such as information and study visits to Germany and other countries in Europe as well as study grants to young professionals who have expressed interest to pursue further training or study in Germany related to the Foundation's development priorities in the country.

Finally, the "Congressional Medal of Achievement" bestowed on the Hanns Seidel Foundation in 2004 is a testament of our dedicated work in the Philippines and successful partnership.



Looking back and to the future, HSF, in cooperation with its partners, takes pride in our collective achievements and hopes to build on the success of its development cooperation in the Philippines in the last four decades as the bilateral relations between Germany and the Philippines become even stronger.

The Dualtech Training Center was installed into the **“Elite Circle of Dual Training System Trailblazers in the Philippines”** by the Technical Education and Skills Development Authority (TESDA), for having pioneered the Dual Training System even before the formal recognition of this training delivery system in the country.

### Train the Trainer Program

In 2001, a **Trainer’s Training Program** for Industrial Trainers - an upgrading program for industry trainers and vocational instructors - was launched by the Dual Training Center Foundation and HSF in the Calabarzon (Cavite, Laguna, Batangas, Rizal, Quezon) area in partnership with Fundacion CODESPA.

HSF also supported a Trainer’s Training Program on Teaching Competencies for industry trainers and supervisors in Mindanao in cooperation with the Center for International Migration (CIM/Germany), and the German Technical Cooperation (GIZ). From 2002-2005, a total of 486 participants representing industry, academe and government agencies participated in 14 training activities that were conducted in key areas in Mindanao.

HSF turned over the project to an independent organization, the **Dualtech Training Center Foundation**, leaving behind a sustainable training institution that continues to train and mould the Filipino youth.

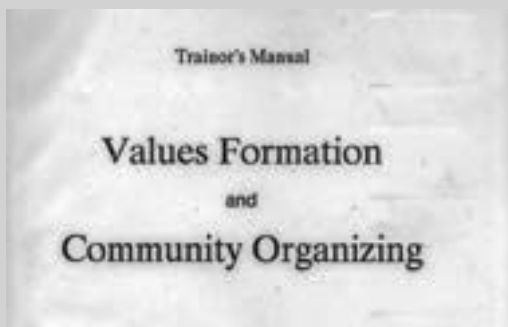

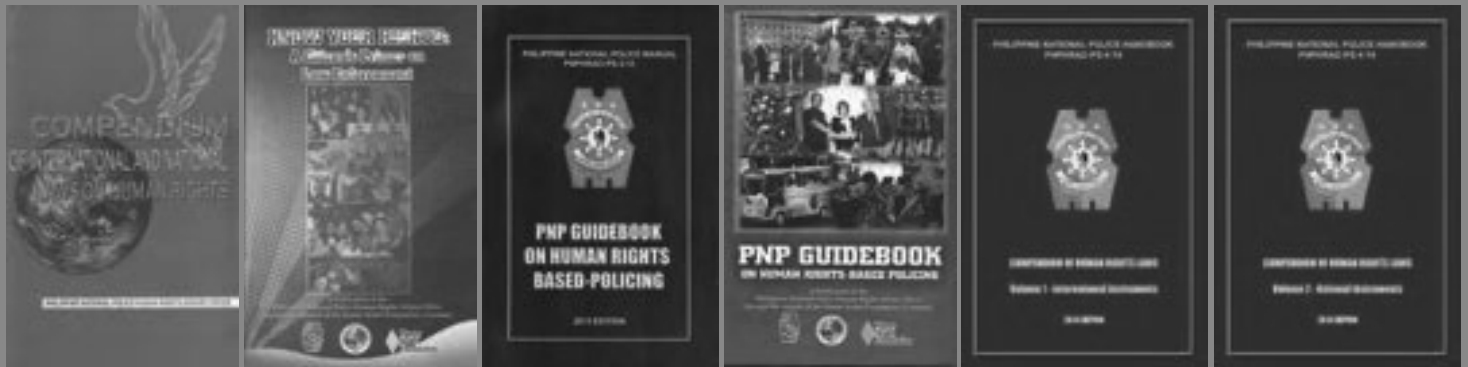

## Outlook for the Future



This publication demonstrates the successful work of the Hanns Seidel Foundation in the Philippines and is dedicated to all our partners and employees in the past, present and future. At the same time, it's a challenge for us to continue this success story further down the road.

I often wonder, what makes Hanns Seidel Foundation different, what is our footprint in the world in general and in the Philippines in particular? I think it is our ability to listen, to respect and to work together with our partners without a moralizing undertone towards a long-term vision.

It's quite common for the Hanns Seidel Foundation to have partnerships that last for more than a decade. This publication emphasizes also this aspect, which, in my opinion, is a key factor for sustainability. Our project collaboration with the Dualtech Training Center (DTC) is the best example: we worked together for almost twenty years and although we turned the project over some 17 years ago, we are still in close contact with the DTC. Such fidelity cannot be taken for granted in today's fast-paced world.

Another important characteristic of HSF's work in the Philippines probably is that we prefer not to be antagonistic and push for mutually beneficial cooperation. Our mission is to be "In the Service of Democracy, Peace and Development." This can be achieved when we are actively supporting an actual effective process to improve a certain situation instead of just simply being against it and not doing something about it. For this reason, it is always our goal to contribute towards an improvement of a particular societal condition rather than complain or be a part of the problem.

With this background, the outlook for HSF's work in the next few years is quite clear and the magic words are "continuity" and "adaptability." Currently, we are working on our country proposal for the next project cycle from 2020 to 2022, which is subject for approval of the German Federal Ministry for Economic Cooperation and Development, our main funding source. Consistent with existing regulations, we are looking forward to continue our cooperation with our current partners as mentioned in this publication.

Since 2008, our main objective in the Philippines is to strengthen the "Rule of law" together with the PNP and other partners. This will be our focus in the future and we are looking forward to:

- Continue to support a community-based and

practice-oriented police training program (basic and advanced) together with the PNP and the PPSC;

- Continue to strengthen the role of policewomen in community-oriented policing together with the PNP;
- Continue to support community-based dialogues on human rights between Civil Society, the Security Sector and the LGUs together with ALG, PAHRA, CHR, AFP and the PNP;
- Continue to support the collaboration and dialogue between public prosecutors and police investigators together with the DoJ-NPS and the PNP;
- And to continue to support regional dialogues with police organizations in ASEAN on community-oriented policing.

On the other hand, since the "birth" of HSF in the Philippines, the end-goal is to strengthen civil society. This will also remain to be a focus area and we are looking forward to:

- Continue to improve the legal empowerment of Muslim Communities in Mindanao together with the NCMF;
- Continue to raise the awareness of the population about federalism and to better prepare them for a possible charter change referendum together with the PILG;
- Continue to support community-based dialogues on human rights between Civil Society, the Security Sector and the LGUs together with ALG, PAHRA, CHR, AFP and the PNP;
- Strengthen the competencies of members of the media about "Civic Journalism" and Decentralization together with the PPI; and
- Help improve the training program of the Bureau of Jail Management and Penology (BJMP) in pursuit of better conditions for inmates/detainees together with the PPSC.

This is our vision for the future and we invite all our partners – government and non-government sectors, project and non-project partners, friends, colleagues and members of the Hanns-Seidel-family in the Philippines to support us as we continue our shared success story in the future.

## About Dr. Hanns Seidel

The foundation was named in honor of Dr. Hanns Seidel in 1967. A prominent public figure who influenced the German post-war history and was among the founding fathers of the Christian Social Union (CSU) in 1945, serving as its party chairman from 1955-1961. His first election victory was in 1946, which saw him enter the Bavarian "Landtag" (Parliament). Between 1947-1954, he served as the Bavarian Minister of Economics and was the Bavarian Prime Minister from 1957-1960.

Dr. Hanns Seidel was responsible for laying the foundations for the free, democratic and federalist framework of the Federal Republic of Germany and the Free State of Bavaria. Additionally, he was involved in the development of the social market economy, thus, contributing to the economic upturn in both Germany and Bavaria as well as developed ideas on the significance of federalism in Germany and Europe.

Dr. Hanns Seidel passed away on August 5, 1961.





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
